Voorhees Lecture on the History of Cartography: 17th-Century Virginia in Maps is scheduled for Saturday, April 28, 2018. This year's featured guest speakers are Dr. Mark Gallivan and Dr. Buck Woodward.

Dr. Gallivan is an anthropology professor at the College of William & Mary whose research centers on Algonquian societies in the Chesapeake. He is particularly interested in ways the Powhatan Indians constructed towns and transformed the broader landscape before the arrival of English settlers on the Eastern Seaboard. Gallivan is a graduate of Georgetown University and received a PhD in anthropology from the University of Virginia. The title for his presentation is "The Map of Virginia: Algonquian and English Cartography in the Seventeenth Century Chesapeake."

Dr. Buck Woodward is a professional lecturer of anthropology at American University in Washington, D.C. He specializes in historical and applied research on indigenous peoples of North America with a focus on the Eastern Woodlands. His research interests include cosmology and ritual life, heritage tourism and museums, kinship, and political economy. His presentation is entitled, "Mapping Colonialism: British Cartography of Indigenous Lands".




