Baker Family. 6 leaves.

Amelia, Caroline, and Princess Anne Counties, and Norfolk and Richmond, Virginia; and Alabama, California, Pennsylvania, Maryland, and Massachusetts, 1813–1972. Bible of Hilary Baker (d. 1840) and Margaret Marshall Roberts Baker (d. 1863). Bible printed in 1816. Other surnames mentioned: Burgwyn, Folkes, Long, Roberts, Robertson, Tyler, and Walke. Gift of Sarah Gayle Hunter Randolph, Irvington. (51437)

Morris-DuVal Family. 8 leaves.

Buckingham, Chesterfield, and Hanover Counties, and Manchester, Richmond, and Williamsburg, Virginia; and Alabama, Arkansas, Georgia, New York, North Carolina, and South Carolina, 1861–2010. Bible of Frank C. DuVal (b. 1861) and Ada C. Morris DuVal (b. 1867). Bible printed in 1888. Includes Bible records (7 leaves) and clippings of obituaries (1 leaf). Other surnames mentioned: Alderman, Coolidge, Cornwell, Detyens, Duke, Fleet, Foster, Goldberg, Hall, Hargrove, Loving, McAlexander, Renn, and Robertson. Loaned for duplication by Dale Hargrove Alderman, Beaverdam. (51416)

Morris-Saunders Family. 14 leaves.

Buckingham County and Staunton, Virginia; and Georgia and Missouri, 1778–1861. Bible of Edward Saunders (1778–1829) and Mary Morris Saunders (1780–1860). Bible printed in 1818. Includes Bible records (6 leaves), correspondence (6 leaves), and a tax receipt (2 leaves). Other surname mentioned: Jones. Correspondence enclosed in the Bible consists of three letters: Morris Saunders in Prairie Bluff, Alabama, to Nathaniel M. Saunders, 12 January 1837, discussing his recent dealings and current prospects in the slave trade business; “Ann” to Mary Saunders, 30 April 1844, upon the death of Mary’s daughter Martha “Patsy” Saunders (1801–1844); Benjamin M. Saunders (1808–1848) to his mother, Mary Saunders, 5 August 1845, regarding his struggles in starting a plantation in Bates County, Missouri, and the lack of attractive women there. Quarles Family. 12 leaves.

King William County, Virginia, 1775–1847. Bible of William Quarles (b. 1775) and Elizabeth (Betsey) Reynolds Quarles (b. 1781). Bible printed in 1812. Other surnames mentioned: Figg and Reynolds. Also appears to list a number of slave births, dating from the late 1700’s (dates indecipherable) to 1847. Loaned for duplication by Laura Church, Moorestown, New Jersey. (51404)

Ledgers, 1884-1906, of the Epps family for stores that they operated in Isle of Wight County, Virginia, under the names E. P. Epps and Son, E. P. Epps and Company, and E. W. Epps. Also includes ledger for a store operated by W. H. Grey and a store possibly run by both Grey and E. W. Epps. Ledgers contain customer accounts. Loaned for microfilming by the Isle of Wight County Museum, Smithfield. (50200)

Ledgers, 1842-1844 and 1852-1853, of W. H. Jordan (ca. 1806-1865), merchant of Isle of Wight County, Virginia, containing accounts for the purchase of dry goods, groceries, shoes, and textiles. Loaned for microfilming by the Isle of Wight County Museum, Smithfield. (50200)

Red Sweet Springs (Alleghany County, Va.). .375 cubic feet.

Records, 1855-1878, of Red Sweet Springs in Alleghany County, Virginia, operated by Cesario Bias (ca. 1800-1866) consisting of two ledgers, 1855-1859, containing accounts of patrons. One ledger has an index. Records also include a photograph of the Bias family; an obituary of Bias; an article and note on religion; recipes for cakes and perfume; an issue, 20 September 1878, of the *Holly Springs Reporter* (Mississippi); advertisements; and a sketch. Archibald-Stewart Family. 3 charts.

Charts. Three genealogical charts showing Archibald-Stewart family lines, include information on ancestors and descendants of Edward Henry Granville Stewart Jr. (1875–1946) and Ethel Frances Archibald Stewart (1873–1961), including lines that settled in Richmond, Virginia; Alabama, Florida, Massachusetts, New Hampshire, New York, North Carolina, Ohio, and Wisconsin; and Canada, England, and Ireland. The first chart was compiled in 1963 by Robin Lankester, the second in 1974 by an unknown compiler, and the third by an unknown compiler at an unknown date. Archibald-Walroth-Stewart Family. 119 pages.

Notes. Includes information on the related Archibald, Walroth (alternately spelled “Wallroth”), and Stewart families, beginning with the descendants of John Archibald of Ireland, including lines that settled in Augusta, Hanover, and Henrico Counties and Richmond, Virginia; Illinois, Massachusetts, New Jersey, North Carolina, Ohio, Pennsylvania, Texas, West Virginia, and Wisconsin; and Australia, Canada, and England. The second section traces the descendants of Karl Frederick Wallroth (1762–1813) of Germany, including lines that settled in Richmond, Virginia; North Carolina and Texas; and England. The third section traces the descendants of Sir Alexander Stewart (1507–1590) of England, including lines that settled in Augusta, Hanover, and Henrico Counties and Richmond, Virginia; California, Illinois, North Carolina, Ohio, Pennsylvania, West Virginia, and Wisconsin; and England and Scotland. Notes. Includes information on the descendants of John Batte (d. 1652) of the part of Charles City County, Virginia, that became Prince George County, Virginia, including information on lines that settled in Charles City, Chesterfield, Henrico, Isle of Wight, and Nottoway Counties, and Norfolk, Petersburg, and Richmond, Virginia; and Alabama, Maryland, Mississippi, New York, North Carolina, and Texas. Other surnames

mentioned: Colley, Cox, Epes, Eppes, Jones, Lyle, Madden, Peterson, Poythress, Russell, and Watkins. Compiled by R. Bolling Batte from 1957 to 1967. Purchased. (51178)

Beadles Family. 58 leaves.

Notes. Include information on the ancestors of Martha A. Beadles McCormack (1840–1904) of Pike County, Indiana, a line that came from England to Virginia in the 1600's and spread out to include descendants in Halifax, King William, and Pittsylvania Counties, Virginia; and Indiana, Kentucky, and North Carolina. The surname was spelled various ways in various records, including Beagles, Bedel, Bedell, and Beedle. This accession also includes limited information on the descendants of Martha A. Beadles McCormack and husband Robert Harvey McCormack (1831–1890). Compiled by the donor in 2011. Gift of Paul Griffith Garland, Sarasota, Florida. (51276)

Also explores other lines in compiler Shirley Brewer Schulze's family, namely: Barnes, Bittle, Bows, Carr, Dunaway, Estes, Fabian, Forehand, McDougal, McGwier, Miersch, Mosley, Nipper, Norwood, Richardson, Schulze, Stutts, Tarpley, Westmoreland, and Wobuse. Entries are for individuals from various Russell family lines, and are presented in strictly chronological order (not divided into distinct lines). Geographically, the entries focus on Russells from Southside Virginia, with an emphasis on Lunenburg County, but also including Amelia, Brunswick, Charles City, Charlotte, Dinwiddie, Henrico, Mecklenburg, New Kent, Surry, and York Counties. Also includes a bibliography, and a chart tracing the descendants of Phillemon Russell Sr. (1700–1775) of Lunenburg County. Compiled by the donor in 2012. Gift of Robert E. Isle of Wight County Museum collection of officials' records, 1848–1884, consist of a ledger, 1848–1849, containing ticket sales, sheriff's fees, parish claims, and merchant licenses; judgment and execution book, 1850–1884, kept by John R. Purdie of Isle of Wight County, containing executions and judgments, as well as a diary, a weather diary, and accounts kept by Purdie as treasurer of Christ Church in Smithfield, Virginia; and an Isle of Wight County treasurer's ledger and daybook, 1871–1881, containing accounts of the county. Loaned for microfilming by the Isle of Wight County Museum, Smithfield. (50200)

PERSONAL PAPERS

Bandoian Family. 28 leaves and 28 pages.

Letters, 1942–1946, of the Bandoian family of Richmond, Virginia, chiefly come from Violet Bandoian (1925–1995) to her brother Carl "Banny" Bandoian (1924–2006) while he was serving with the 86th Infantry Division of the United States Army. Topics include Violet's job working for Dean H. H. Hibbs Jr. (1887–1977) in the Treasurer's Office at Richmond Professional Institute; her romantic prospects and social life; the return of various soldiers, and celebrations marking the end of World War II; observations of students, staff, and faculty at RPI; and religious and social gatherings in the Armenian community. There is also one letter, 11 August 1942, from Carl Bandoian in New York City to his family, and one undated letter to Carl from his father, David Bandoian (1893–1965). Purchased. (51387)

Barham, S. B. 1 reel of microfilm. (*Misc. reel 6218*)

Ledgers and diaries, 1876–1897, of S. B. Barham (1838–1915) of Surry County, Virginia, detailing Barham's life as a physician, farmer, and politician in Surry County. Some ledgers are indexed account books showing payments owed Barham for medical services. Memoranda book, 1893–1897, contains information regarding Barham's service representing Surry and Prince George Counties in the Virginia House of Delegates. Papers, 1921–1996, of R. Bolling Batte (1906–1996) of Richmond and Chesterfield County, Virginia, consisting of appointments, articles, cards, certificates, clippings, correspondence, deposit books, diplomas, envelopes, grade reports, invitations, military orders, newspapers, pamphlets, photographs, powers of attorney, receipts, and other papers concerning Batte's personal life and his military service, as well as papers concerning son Robert Bolling Batte IV (1943–). Beard Family. 4.2 cubic feet.

Papers, 1870–1932 of the Beard family of Augusta County, Virginia, namely Gleaves C. Beard, Jr. (1903–1955) and his wife, Lois Menita (Landes) Beard (1906–1969), include an account book, autograph book, correspondence, diaries, greeting cards, ledgers, photographs and negatives, postcards, programs, report cards, and wedding invitations. The majority of the collection consists of correspondence written between the two just prior to their marriage in 1930, while she was teaching in Crabbottom (now Blue Grass), Highland County, Virginia, and he was working in his uncle's general store and living in Fort Defiance and New Hope in Augusta County. Letter, 4 November 1863, from R. R. Blackington (1834–1912) of Company I, 20th Maine Infantry, in Culpeper County, Virginia, to his mother, Louisa Blackington (1816–1894), detailing how the regiment stripped homes for items to use in camp, providing other news, and asking for stockings that he could sell. Purchased. (51446)

Boush Family. .225 cubic feet.

Papers, 1855–2012, of the Boush family of Norfolk and Virginia Beach, Virginia, containing a Boush family genealogy; portraits and photographs of the Boush family; a clipping and a card for Boy Scout Troop 62 (Oceana); power of attorney from Eileen Boush Davis to Eileen Davis Vernon; papers relating to the 1762 Samuel Boush map of Norfolk; appraisal of the artwork owned by Eileen Davis; 1862 sketch of Norfolk from *Harper's Weekly*; *Ye Hysterical Historie of Norfolk Towne* by Frank Wing; and transcript of a letter, 5 February 1855, from Richard Wagner to a friend. Brant (ca. 1827–1900) of Company B, 11th New Hampshire Infantry, to his mother, Abigail Brant of Lincoln County, Maine, commenting on the battle of Fredericksburg as well as personal news, including having spoken with his brother Levi Brant. Purchased. (51445)

Letters, 1880–1895, written to John L. Burns (1865–1960) of Bath County, Virginia, by Minnie A. Butler (b. ca. 1865), Cornelia F. Folks (b. 1869), and Katie S. Sheffer, of Bath and Highland Counties, Virginia. Subjects include courtship, health, weather, mail deliveries, attending church services, visits and other social activities, and poetry. Purchased. (51427)

Chumbley Family. 12 pages, 2 leaves, and 1 photograph.

Papers, 1862–1864 and circa 1896, of the Chumbley family of Pulaski County, Virginia, include letters, 1862 and 1864, from William Allen Chumbley (1841–1917) to his future wife, Mary “Mollie” Crockett Hickman (1846–1917), and one letter, 10 October 1864, from Mary to William, written while he was serving with the 4th Virginia Infantry and she was studying at Hollins Institute. William’s letters discuss mutual friends, military action including fighting at Strasburg and the Third Battle of Winchester, and his devotion to her. Mary’s letter gives news of friends and family, and tells of the neighborhood’s relief when dire news about the fate of Douthat’s Battery proved to be in error. Also included is a family portrait, taken circa 1896, showing William and Mary Chumbley surrounded by their ten children in the yard of their home near Fairlawn, Pulaski County, Virginia, and background information provided by the donor of the collection. Papers, 1863–2008, of Robert Young Clay (1936–2010) of Richmond, Virginia, including correspondence, photographs, and a sales ledger relating to his work as a landscape artist, as well as books, genealogical notes on the Clay family and allied lines, materials concerning Land Office records and genealogical sources at the Library of Virginia, obituaries, and photographs. Letter, 12 November 1864, from John F. Croom (1840–1924) of Company E, 18th North Carolina Infantry, imprisoned at Elmira, New York, to Fanny Smiley of Providence, Rhode Island, thanking her for thinking of him and for sending a package. Croom notes that he will be able to get a camp ring made for a friend of Fanny. Purchased. (51449)

Hale, Frederick C. 112 pages.

Letters, 1862–1865, of Frederick C. Hale (1844–1921) of Company F, 118th New York Infantry, to his family in Essex County, New York, detailing his service with the regiment at various camps, including Fort Ethan Allen in Alexandria (Arlington) County, Virginia, and Camp Adirondack in Washington, D.C., as well as his duties as a clerk in various military departments, including the Inspector General’s Office and the Department of Virginia and North Carolina. Hale comments on his duties, fellow soldiers, the weather, and general news about the war. Purchased. (51450)

Hamner, Earl, Jr. 15.925 cubic feet.

Papers, 1938–2013, of Earl Hamner, Jr. (1938–), including books, clippings, correspondence, DVD’s, newsletters, photographs, publicity, film, radio, and television scripts, speeches, subject files, and videotapes, relating to his career in the entertainment industry, most notably as creator and writer of the television series *The Waltons* and *Falcon Crest*. Papers, 1929–1986 and undated, of Frank D. Johnson (1912–1995) of Richmond, Virginia, include an undated photo album devoted chiefly to his service with the 246th Coast Artillery Regiment band during World War II. Many of the photos in the album are captioned with the names of servicemen pictured, and were taken in large part at Ft. Story, Virginia. Also included is a scrapbook, 1929–1974, kept by Johnson, containing clippings about events and people at Ft. Photos taken during the war show Johnson and fellow soldiers home in Richmond on break from maneuvers in Tennessee, 1943; and in Heidelberg and Straubing, Germany, and Paris and Reims, France, in 1945. Papers, 1904, 1911–1965, of S. Floyd Landreth (1885–1977) of Carroll County and Galax, Virginia, focus chiefly on his involvement in the aftermath of the 14 March 1912 shootout at the Carroll County courthouse in Hillsville, Virginia. Included are Circuit Court Clerk Dexter Goad's telegram to Governor William Hodges Mann alerting him to the tragedy; an undated note from E. D. Wornell alerting Landreth to another man's statement indicating premeditation by the Allen family; three letters, 1912–1913 between Landreth and Governor Mann regarding the case and proposed commutations of the death sentences of Floyd Allen (1856–1913) and Claude Allen (1889–1913); extensive correspondence and accounts, 1914–1922, regarding a chancery suit filed to subject land belonging to Sidna Allen (1866–1941) to the payment of judgments against him; and letters, 1965, regarding plans of WDBJ Television (Roanoke) to produce a program on the tragedy. Also included are photographs showing the Allen and Edwards men and sites associated with them, a re-enactment of the shooting, and group portraits of surviving witnesses, as well as a collage of portraits of the three representatives of the court killed in the shootout. Rucker (1830–1908) of Company A, 2nd Tennessee Infantry, in northern Virginia, to his parents Samuel Reed Rucker (1794–1862) and Martha Bedford Martin Rucker (b. ca. 1809) in Rutherford County, Tennessee, concerning the defeat of the Confederate army in the Battle of Mill Springs, Kentucky, on 19 January 1862, and the death of General Felix Zollicoffer (1812–1862) during the battle. Rucker notes that his regiment's colonel is trying to have the regiment reenlist for two years and working to have it reassigned to Tennessee. Rucker states that once his enlistment is up, he is returning home. Purchased. (51448)
