(Richmond, Virginia) – Genealogy is a hot topic that shows no signs of cooling off. DNA testing frequently makes headlines. TV turns family history into entertainment with shows like PBS's *Finding Your Roots* and *Genealogy Roadshow* and TLC's *Who Do You Think You Are?* Ancestry's family history websites have more than 3 million paying subscribers. Articles in *USA Today* and *Time* have proclaimed genealogy as the second-most popular hobby after gardening and the second-most visited website category after pornography. There's no denying that people today are fascinated with their family trees.

Here in commonwealth, the Library of Virginia has the content that family history researchers seek. Many users consider it Virginia's family history headquarters. A state agency that serves as the state library and archives, the Library is the most comprehensive resource in the world for the study of Virginia history, culture, and government. Researchers from across the globe use the Library's online resources, while visitors to the building find even more materials, as well as the expert guidance offered by the Library's professional staff. (That's why genealogy TV shows consistently send their researchers and celebrity subjects to visit the Library.) Those who are new to family history research or who want to delve deeper into the records can take advantage of the **Library of Virginia's Genealogy Workshop Series**.

This year's series includes beginner and intermediate workshops; workshops on African American, military, census, and immigration records; and a workshop on little-known records for family history research such as mental hospital and penitentiary records. Library staff members travel to Yorktown this year to offer two workshops at the American Revolution Museum.
